

A short trip to Lorraine (11-16 Juin 2024)


Tuesday 11 June

Arrival at 19:44 at Nancy's train station. Diner at home.

Wednesday 12 June: Excursion to Metz (by train)



Just outside the train station (14), see *Centre Pompidou – Metz* (19), then the Imperial part of the town, including the train station (14) and *Avenue Foch* (17).



We turn left towards the medieval part of the town: *Place St Louis* (9), then *St Etienne Cathedral* (1):



Afternoon: We cross one arm of the *Moselle* to see *Place de la Comédie* (21) and *Temple Neuf* (23), located on a small island:



Then we walk towards the gardens of the *Esplanade*, to see the *Chapelle des Templiers* (31) near the *Arsenal* (32), and *St Pierre aux Nonnains* (30).


From there, we walk towards the *Porte des Allemands* (10), then we go back to the city centre through the *Rue des Allemands*, where we stop to visit the beautiful church of St Eucaire (11):




On our way back to the train station, we stop at Place St Louis for having some rest and refreshments.

Thursday 13 June: Excursion to Luxembourg city (by train)

with the detail of the city centre here below:



Just outside the train station, we take the tramway to the city centre, stop at "Hamilius", *Boulevard Royal* (see the red cross on the map). Walk in the direction of the *Place d'Armes*, stop at the Cercle Cité where stands the tourist office to ask for a city map. Then turn on the right, *Rue Chimay*, to go to *Place de la Constitution*, for a stunning view on the Petrusse. Walk to *Notre Dame* Cathedral, for a quick visit, then *Rue du Marché aux Herbes*, to see the Palace of the Grand-Duc:



We turn on the left-hand side into the *Grand-Rue* for having lunch at Oberweis.

In the afternoon, we take *Rue de la Porte Neuve* to enter the gardens in the direction of Vauban Museum. Visit of the permanent exhibition: <https://villavauban.lu/en/>

En route to the train station, through *Boulevard Emile Reuter* and *Avenue de la Liberté*, we stop on *Pont Adolphe* to admire the striking view of the city fortifications by Vauban and the *Ville Haute*:





Nearby, as a transition to Nancy's medieval areas that we'll be visiting the next day, stand two reminders of the famous Battle of Nancy, fought in 1477, in which René II, Duke of Lorraine, won again *Charles le Téméraire*, Duke of Burgundy:





Saturday 15 June: Nancy's 18th-century and medieval areas:

See Cathedral *Notre-Dame-de-l'Annonciation* (rue St Georges), *Place Stanislas*, *Place de la Carrière*, where stands the Palace of the Government:





A short stroll in the *Pépinière* gardens, then passing through the delightful garden of the Palace of the Government, we enter the medieval and Renaissance parts of Nancy (the Old Town):
