

A Trip to Southern Lorraine & Alsace (8-15 May 2024)

Introductory notes:

From abroad, there are at least two practical ways to reach Nancy:

- 1) From *Paris-Charles de Gaulle* airport, you take a direct TGV train from that airport (terminal 2) to *Lorraine TGV* station. There, a shuttle (bus) drives you to the city centre.
- 2) Eurostar trains from London to *Paris Gare du Nord* station, then a 10-minute walk to *Paris Gare de l'Est* station, where a direct TGV train brings you to Nancy train station, in the city centre.

Wednesday 8 May

Arrival of my guests at *Lorraine* TGV station around 12:30. Lunch and rest.

Thursday 9 May

Morning: visit the Renaissance and 18th-century areas in Nancy.

Walk in *St Jean* and *St George* streets: Cathedral *Notre-Dame-de-l'Annonciation* and *Porte St Georges*.



We arrive on the famous *Place Stanislas* (architect: Emmanuel Héré) with its gorgeous ironwork by Jean Lamour, and fountains by D. B. Guibal:



And in the continuity of Place Stanislas, we find *Place de la Carrière*, with the *Palace of the Government* in the background:



A short stroll in the *Pépinière* gardens, then passing through the delightful garden of the Palace of the Government, we enter the medieval and Renaissance parts of Nancy (the Old Town):

We then pass by *St Epvre* church and finish our stroll in the Old Town through the *Rue des Maréchaux* and its many restaurants.

Afternoon:

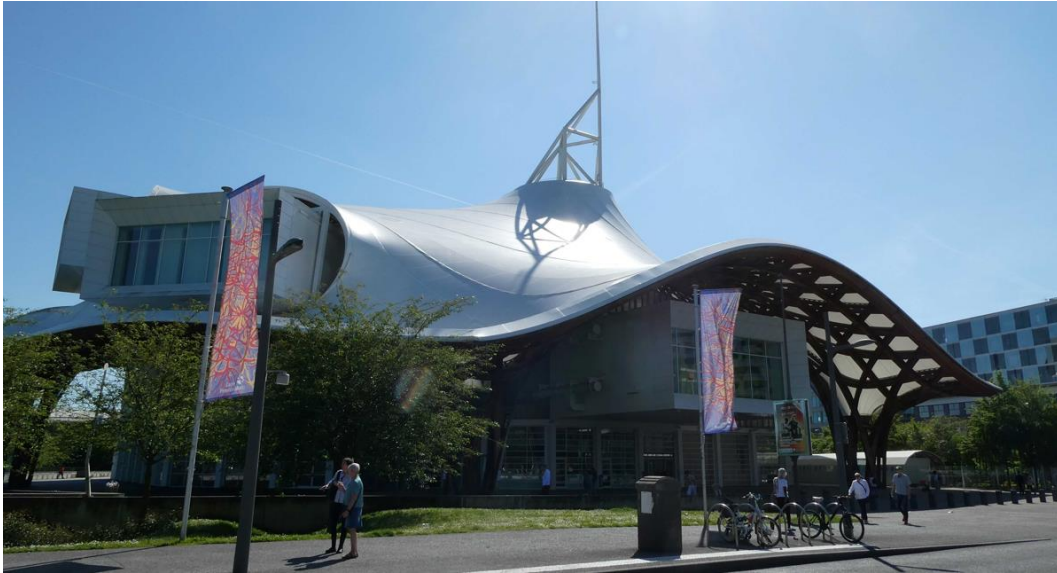
Visit the Renaissance castle of Fléville, located near Nancy: <https://www.chateaudefleville.com/>.

Guided tour in the castle, then a stroll in the park and gardens.



Friday 10 May

Travel to Metz (by train): <https://www.tourisme-metz.com/en/discover-metz-metropole/visit-metz-metropole-in-one-day>. Close to the exit of the train station, we had a look at the Museum *Pompidou* Metz: [Centre Pompidou Metz: Welcome \(centrepompidou-metz.fr\)](http://centrepompidou-metz.fr)



Going back in the direction of the train station, we then visited the Imperial part of the town and its impressive building, such as the railway station and its water tower, the post office, *Avenue Foch*, etc. We then saw the medieval place *St Louis*, with its arcades, then the Cathedral *St Etienne* and its beautiful stained glass windows, including those created by Chagall: [La cathédrale Saint-Étienne de Metz \(catholique.fr\)](http://La.cathedrale.Saint-Etienne.de.Metz.catholique.fr).

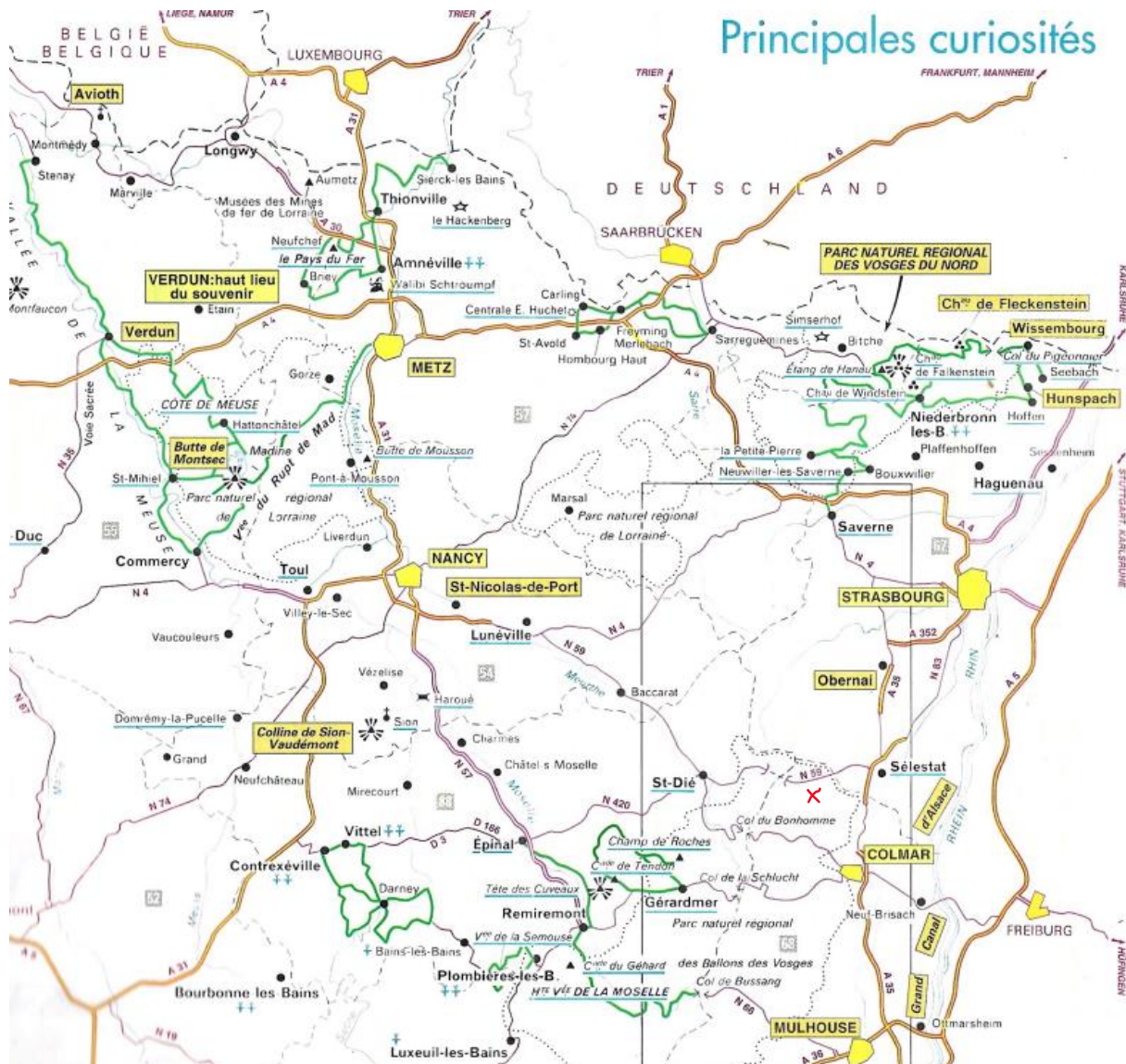


Afternoon: Stroll in the pedestrian streets, across the *Moselle* to the *Place de la Comédie* and the New Temple:



Saturday 11 May

We start our round trip to the *Vosges* and *Alsace*. First destination: the Castle of *Haut-Koenigsbourg*. From Nancy, take A33 then N333 to Lunéville, then N59. For a scenic route, take D459 to *Ste Marie aux Mines* via the “*col de Ste Marie*”.

“Since its construction in the 12th century, the Haut-Koenigsbourg castle has been a constant witness to both European conflicts and rivalry between lords, kings and emperors.

A number of illustrious owners each left their mark on the castle's history, and successive events even led to changes in the castle's structure...”

Then, *enroute* to the Vosges, lunch (sandwiches) at Munster. Take road 417, drive by *Col de la Schlucht* (altitude: 1139 m) Stop to admire the landscape and the two lakes called Longemer and Retournemer.

On our way back to Nancy, as the gardens at Berchigranges (<https://www.berchigranges.com/>) are closed on Monday, we stopped at Lunéville to visit the Castle: <https://chateauluneville.meurthe-et-moselle.fr/fr/visiter-le-ch%C3%A2teau/>:



Then, we stopped at St Nicolas de Port to visit the *Basilique of St Nicolas*, built in the 15th and 16th centuries by René II, duke of Lorraine and Bar, to thank God for his victory in the Battle of Nancy, fought on 5 January 1477.



Tuesday 14 May

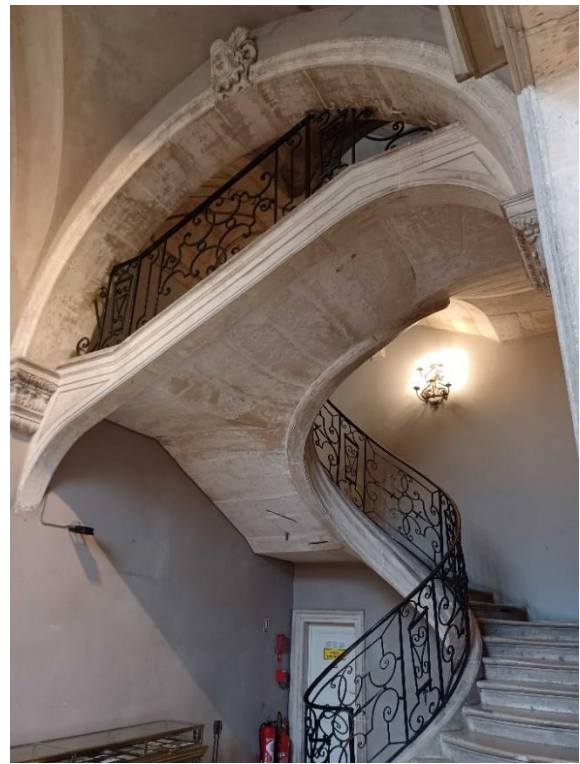

Mercredi 15 mai
